But Grant should be chomping at the bit to get in the rink with Cutts and the Texans. The lanky Eagle goalie, whose record for the season is 9-10-3 with a 3.01 goals-against mark, was in the nets for last Saturday's 3-1 Eagle defeat at the hands of Tulsa.

And Grant enters Wednesday's game knowing he is, once again, the No. 1 Salt Lake goaltender. The trade by the parent St. Louis Blues Tuesday which sent veteran Eddie Johnston to the Chicago Black Hawks, necessitated the callup of Staniowski.

Before Yves Belanger came down to Salt Lake two months ago and before Staniowski joined the club after Belanger was traded to Atlanta, Grant had played every game for the Eagles and he admitted he played better when he played more often.

He will have a chance to back up that statement because even when the Eagles get another goalie assigned, Mr. Grant is THE man now for playercoach Barclay Plager.

While Cutts was going 3-1 last week, Grant stands 3-1-1 in his last five games. The matchup should prove superb and fans are in for a double treat since Fort Worth stays in town to play the Eagles again Friday to conclude the Big Birds' eight-game homestand.

Wednesday also represents a big night for the bockey faithful who have followed veteran Lyle Bradley's career in Eagle colors. Bradley, who will be playing his 459th game as an Eagle, will be gunning for his 500th career point . . . certainly a coveted milestone for any player.

## Larry Wilson Paid Price for Football Greatness


