Prior to Friday night's full slate of prep basketball action, it looked like a quiet evening with no key matchups in the state's 4A and 3A regions.

So what happens? Upsets. There were no less than seven upsets and several near-upsets in a crazy night of high school play.

The only regions to escape the upset fever were Regions Two and Three as Regions One, Four, Five, and Six each had one or two upsets spice their play.

In Region One Roy outdueled previously-ranked Layton 72-60 and Viewmont came back to defeat Weber 62-60; Logan surprised Ogden 81-70, while Davis took it on the chin from Ben Lomond 62-54 in Region Four; last-place Union knocked off unbeaten Cyprus 52-48 and Tooele edged Judge in Region Five; and Pleasant Grove topped American Fork 48-43 in a Region Six upset.

Now for a more in-depth look at each of the regions.

Region Two

The race is on in Region Two and is getting very tight in the middle. After Friday's play, Hillcrest maintained its first-place standing, Brighton moved to secure a second place berth, while Bingham stepped into a three-way tie for third with losers Granger and Orem.

At Minersville, Bingham's gym turned into a three-ring circus.

In the first period it looked like no contest with Bingham leading 18-7. Then early in the second period, Bingham's George Sluga drew three fast technicals and was ordered out of the game for the first time in his career.

After calmly settling in the stands, Sluga called instructions to the bench via walkie-talkie. That is until Kearns coach Ron Carling, incensed over the matter, ran out to complain to the referees about it. The refs promptly halted the "radio-coaching."

Back at the ranch, the Miners under assistant coach Keith Chapple lost the lead, but came back before the half to lead 31-28.

The second half saw both teams pressing much of the time as the game stayed a three-to-five point affair.

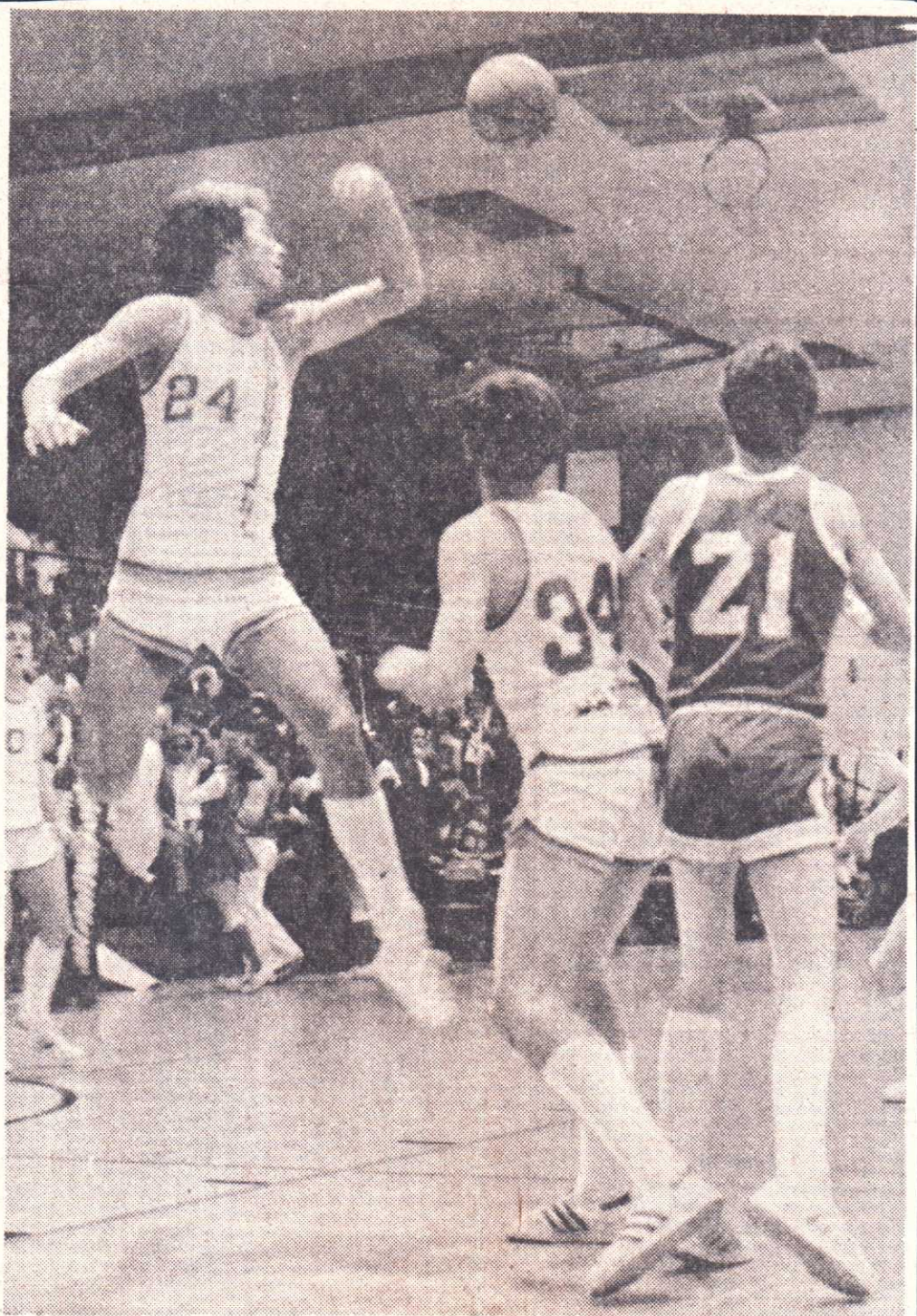
The Miners' Shawn Larsen crushed the Cougars' hopes with some key free throw shooting and Bingham won 63-59.

Following a couple of close losses a week earlier, Sluga said, "It feels good to win a close game."

Mike Crellin led the Miners with 28 points, while Tom Roberts pulled down 12 rebounds. Todd Clark and D.J. Morley each had 17 for Kearns.

Brighton relied on long accurate shooting to secure its solitary 4-2 second-place spot in the region by downing Orem 64-61.

With just five seconds to go and the Bengals up by one, Brighton's Mike Hudson hit two foul shots to ice the victory. Hudson had 16 along with Brad Steinke to lead the Bengals, while Chris McMullin put in 27 for the Tigers.

Hillcrest came away with a 65-55 win over a tenacious Granger crew and it wasn't easy.

"Granger played extremely well," said Hillcrest coach Jim Jimas. His team led by at least five most of the game and was aided by three Lancer players fouling out in the second half.

Mike Bernardo and Bob Demarco had 15 and 14, respectively, versus Granger's Matt Almond with 17 and Lee Giles with 14.

Region Three

About the only unexpected happening in Region Three was the closeness of the East-Cottonwood contest.

East came into the game as the only undefeated team in the region, while Cottonwood had only one league win under its belt.

The Colts cut a 15-point Leopard lead to one in the closing minutes, but Greg Grant hit four consecutive free throws to seal the East

win. Grant finished the night with 30 points and George Furgis ended up with 16 in the Leopard cause.

Jim Brown had 18 and Tim Whitworth 16 for the hard-luck Colts.

In a game Ram coach Larry Maxwell termed "rough and aggressive", Highland opened up a big lead late in the game to coast past Granite 91-70.

Mike Maxwell as usual led the Rams with 30 points, and John Baucom came back from a poor showing at Skyline to pour in 28. Kevin Kuhn led the Farmer attack with 24.

In another cakewalk, Skyline opened up a 25-point first-half lead and had 10 of 12 players score in its 89-63 win over Olympus.

Paul Rasmussen led a balanced Eagle attack with 16 and Willie Wright topped Olympus with 15.

Region Five

The Judge Memorial Bulldogs were upset by a determined Tooele squad 60-59 in a close game at Tooele. "It was close all the way. The lead seesawed back and forth all night," Buffalo coach Mike Johnson said, "Jeff Kinney sunk a couple of foul shots with seconds to go that gave us the lead at the last. We had had a couple of bad weeks and were kind of down in the dumps. The kids really got up for the game, though. We attacked them inside and took it to them with Bret Applegate."

Applegate led the scoring with 27 points, and Gary Bennion added 10 points. Bennion, a junior, filled in at guard and gave the team composure, Johnson said.

Steve Bills was high man for Judge with 15 points. Joe Rotta followed with 14. Brian Bentrude had 10 and Andy Mates had 11.

Union pulled the big upset of the evening by downing Cyprus 52-48. Pirate coach Keith Macfarlane's bubble finally burst but his team remains in first place. Alan Dyches led the scoring for Cyprus with 13. Brooks Jones added 12 points in the losing effort.

Clayton Truman was high scorer for Union with 14, Karl Mortensen followed with 12, and Doug Chasel had 10. This was the second win in a row for Union who now stands 2-3 in season play.

Kerry Rupp's Utes from Uintah had a tough battle with Jordan but came away with a 68-66 mild upset. This leaves both teams with 2-3 season records.

Rupp said the game went down to the wire, "It was a close game. We fell behind, battled back, took the lead and then Jordan came back again. There was only a two or three point difference in the last 3 minutes of the game three," he said.

Darrin Gardiner led the Utes with 20 points. Ron Eellis, Ron Gardner and Ron McClellan each added 10. Lynn Jensen and Steve Henricks each scored 15 points for Jordan.

In the other Region Five contest, Murray downed Carbon 80-51. Cizo Goncalves led the scoring for the Spartans with 28 points. Brad Hale followed with 21 points while Jeff Rogers had 12 and Steve Chapman had 10 points.

Murray is now 4-1 in season play, tied for first with Cyprus. Judge holds the second place spot at 3-2 while Jordan, Tooele, Union and Uintah are all sporting 2-3 records.

Region Four

The favorites didn't play their roles in Friday night's Region Four cage action. Logan and Ben Lomond each scored major upsets and a near-upset was recorded by Bear River. Even the winless South Cubs gave league-leader Woods Cross all they could handle.

Woods Cross, which had a 6-0 mark compared to South's 0-6 record going into the game, had a heck of a time holding off the pesky Cubs.

The game was tied 31-31 at the half before the Wildcats broke away in the third period to finally win 67-59.

Jeff Ostler's 21 points were high for Woods Cross and he was followed closely by Mark McCleery with 20. South was led by junior Anthony Nelson, who poured in 27 points.
