Skyline foils Cottonwood hopes

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It seemed like a good possibility for a Colt upset Tuesday night when Cottonwood and Skyline went at it in a Region Three encounter.

Because (1) Cottonwood had won three of its last four, the only loss being a three-pointer to unbeaten East; (2) Skyline had just come off two cakewalks and could have been looking ahead to its next game with East; and (3) the game was being played at Cottonwood.

For one half Tuesday night, it looked as if the upset might materialize as the Colts took a 31-26 halftime lead. But it didn't last long as Skyline made the necessary halftime adjustments to get on top and finish with a comfortable 71-52 victory.

Skyline coach Paul Jeppesen explained the difference. "In the first half we were just standing around and we weren't hitting our shots," he said. "We went into a trapping defense in the second half, caused some turnovers and our shots started to fall."


Going into the last quarter, it was still anybody's ball game with Skyline holding just a 49-47 lead. But the Colts went six minutes without scoring a field goal, while the Eagles rolled up a 22-5 last-quarter margin to win going away.

Jeppesen was extremely pleased with the play of his bench. "Dixon Duncan did a super job coming off the bench, scoring 12 points," he said. "We have a lot of depth with eight or nine guys who can do the job. Our problem is getting time for them all to play."

Scott Spurrier was the top scorer on the court with 21 points for the Eagles, while Jim Brown had 19 for Cottonwood. The Colts were hurt by the loss of 6-foot-7 Tim Whitworth, who was out with an injury.

Most coaches are happy after a 30-point victory. But after his team's 88-58 win over West, Highland coach Larry Maxwell was upset because he thought a couple of West substitutes were playing a little too roughly late in the game.

West coach Clark Godfrey saw differently. "I really didn't think we were too rough. We just played hard — and they played played hard too," he said.
