A wide variety of performers were brought to the Dixie College campus by the Southwest Series.




The Spring Production was The Heires





As a memento, each girl was presented with a silk rose.






















PRESIDENT WADE FRIEND TO ALL

Even on his busiest of days, President Wade had the time to storand chat with students. If there wasn't time, he would make somehow. Always ready with a warm smile, and a firm handshak President Wade became more than a friend to the students at Die College this year. He was a father figure, someone to look to, and guide us through what became a fantastic year.

Born in Lemington, Utah, he attended high school in Millard at then graduated form B.Y.U. in 1959 with a B.S. in Politic Science. He later received an M.A. from Long Beach State in 196 again in Political Science. In 1963 he returned to B.Y.U. to ea an Ed.D. in Educational Administration.

President Wade has spent several years working in the LDS Chur school system as an administrator. Much of his work has taken hi around the world.

During June of 1971, he became an Assistant to the Administrat of the LDS church schools, and in 1972, became the Administrat of the Church Schools in the Pacific Area. In 1976 he assumthe responsibilities of the Zone Administrator in charge of the formal and religious education programs in seven internaitonal and domestic areas of the church.

In January of 1981 Dr. Wade was appointed President of Dis College, replacing Dr. Rolf Kerr. He assumed his place as the 13 president of Dixie College with the inauguration ceremonies he in conjunction with the annual commencement exercises on M $29,\ 1981.$

President Wade is married to the lovely Diana Daniels Wade, at they are the parents of eight children.






THE '82 SEASON WAS A SUCCESSFUL ONE








Pitch, Hit, And Run!

The Confederate '83 Staff






During the month of October, Delta Psi Omega worked with Phi Rho Pi in sponsoring the annual Haunted House, and group also sponsored a sock hop later during the year.




Milestone Reached

Paul William "Bear" Bryant, The winningest coach in football history, died this year only five weeks after leading the Crimson Tide of Alabama o victory in the Dec, 29th Liberty Bowl.

Bryant, 69, died of a heart attack complicated by a series of other problems which he was said to have fought "heroically."

Bear, who had announced his retirement prior o the Liberty Bowl led his teams to 323 victories durng his 38 years of head coaching, 25 of which he spent at Alabama.

In a letter Bryant wrote to one of his former players shortly before his death, he said, "Frankly am sometimes embarassed by the accolades that have been given me, because never enough is said about the people who worked so hard for me, individuals like you." He closed by saying that his wife of 47 years, Mary Harmon, "sends her love."


