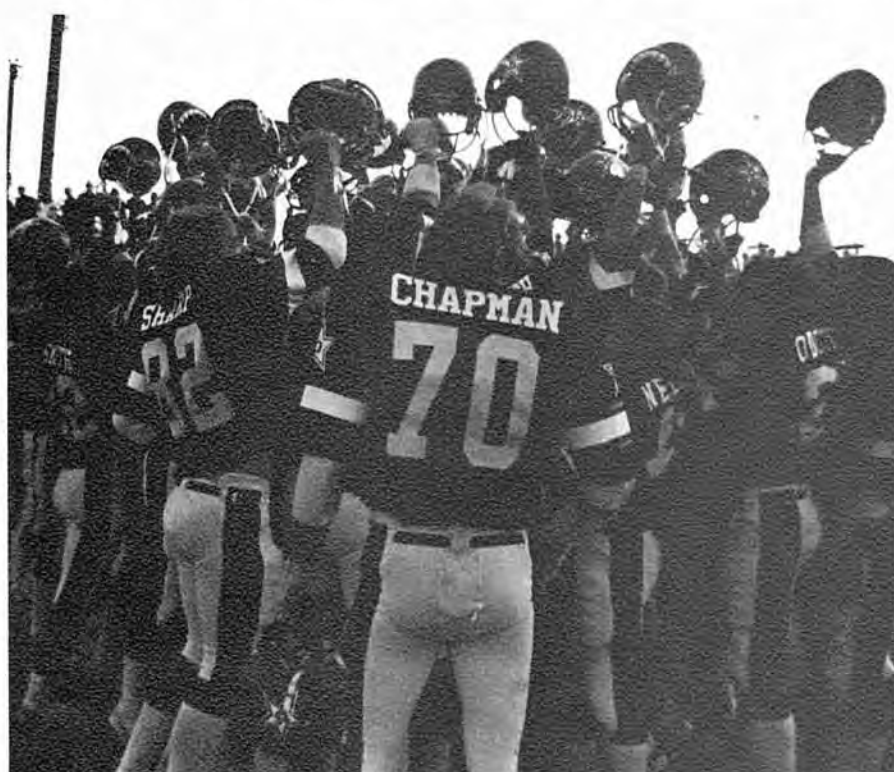
Dixie Downs Ricks With A

Founder's Day Assembly

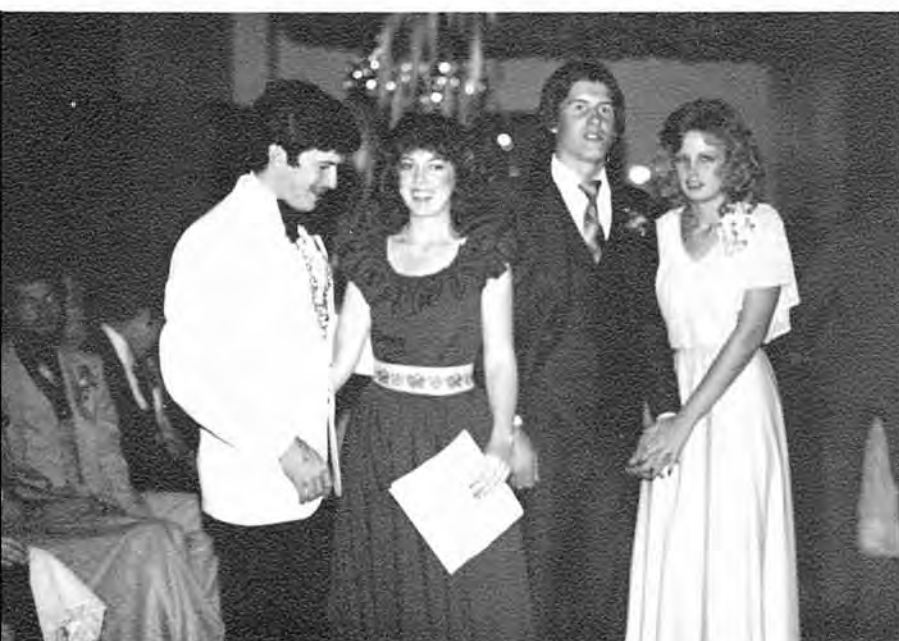

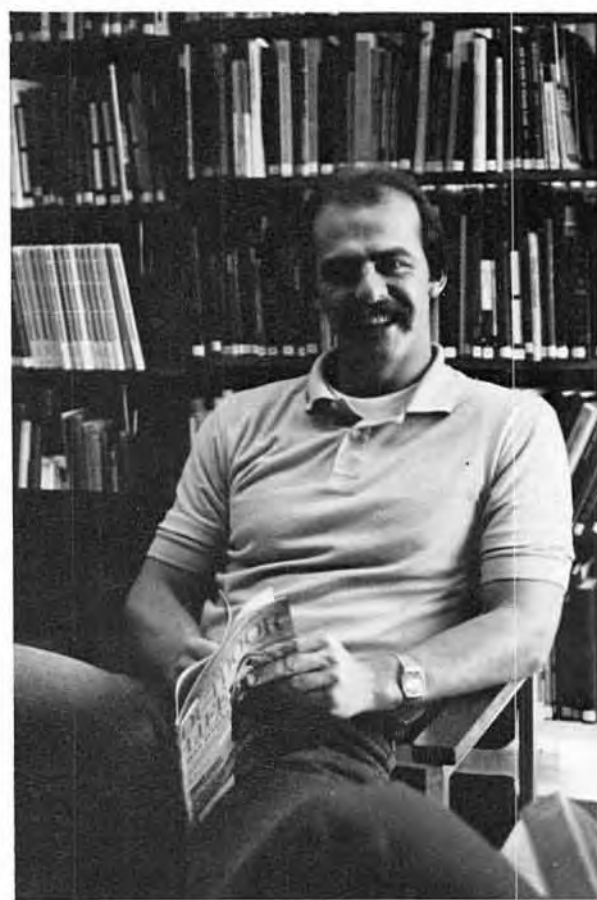
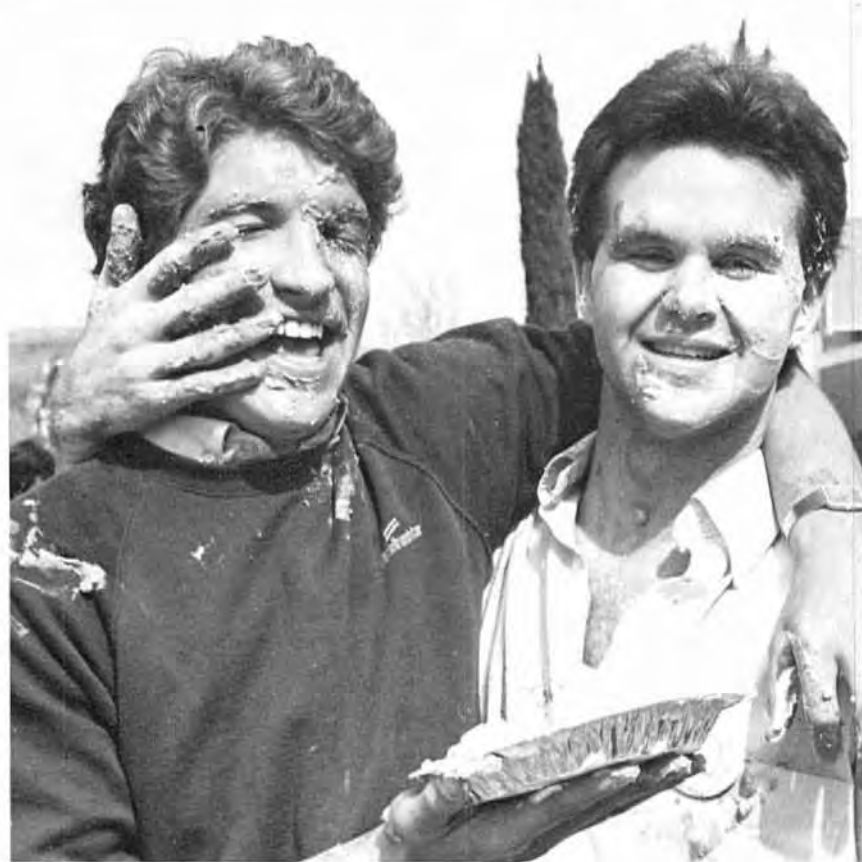


Christmas Week

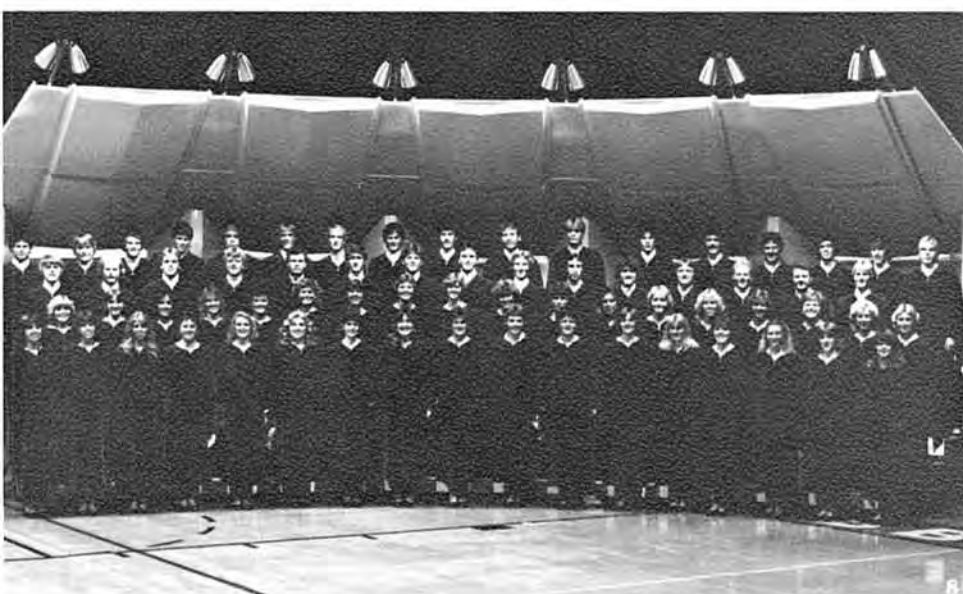

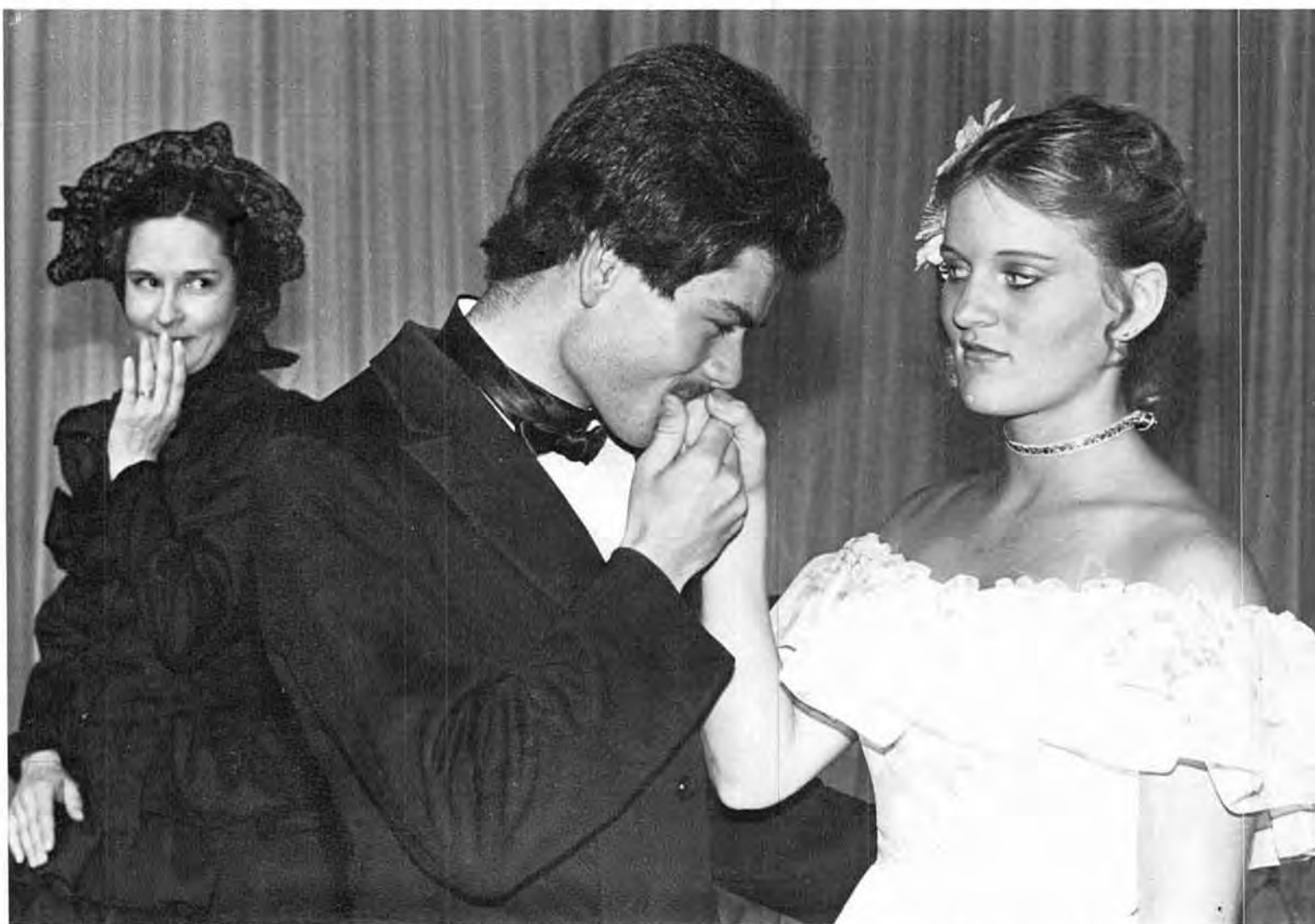
The Spring Production was The Heiress

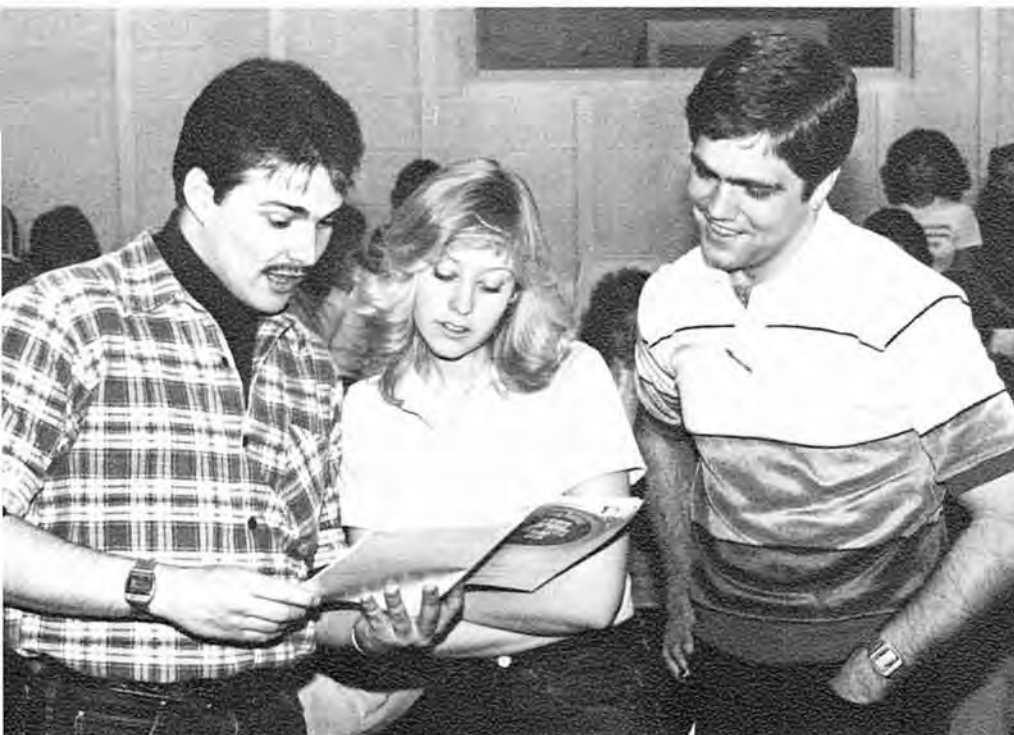

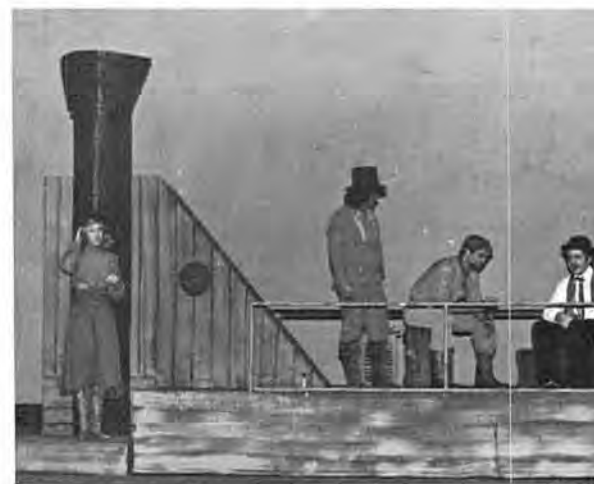

Dr. Alton L. Wade
President of Dixie College

PRESIDENT WADE FRIEND TO ALL

Even on his busiest of days, President Wade had the time to stop and chat with students. If there wasn't time, he would make somehow. Always ready with a warm smile, and a firm handshake, President Wade became more than a friend to the students at Dixie College this year. He was a father figure, someone to look up to, and guide us through what became a fantastic year.

Born in Lemington, Utah, he attended high school in Millard and then graduated from B.Y.U. in 1959 with a B.S. in Political Science. He later received an M.A. from Long Beach State in 1961 again in Political Science. In 1963 he returned to B.Y.U. to earn an Ed.D. in Educational Administration.

President Wade has spent several years working in the LDS Church school system as an administrator. Much of his work has taken him around the world.

During June of 1971, he became an Assistant to the Administrator of the LDS church schools, and in 1972, became the Administrator of the Church Schools in the Pacific Area. In 1976 he assumed the responsibilities of the Zone Administrator in charge of the formal and religious education programs in seven international and domestic areas of the church.

In January of 1981 Dr. Wade was appointed President of Dixie College, replacing Dr. Rolf Kerr. He assumed his place as the 13th president of Dixie College with the inauguration ceremonies held in conjunction with the annual commencement exercises on May 29, 1981.

President Wade is married to the lovely Diana Daniels Wade, and they are the parents of eight children.

During the month of October, Delta Psi Omega worked with Phi Rho Pi in sponsoring the annual Haunted House, and group also sponsored a sock hop later during the year.

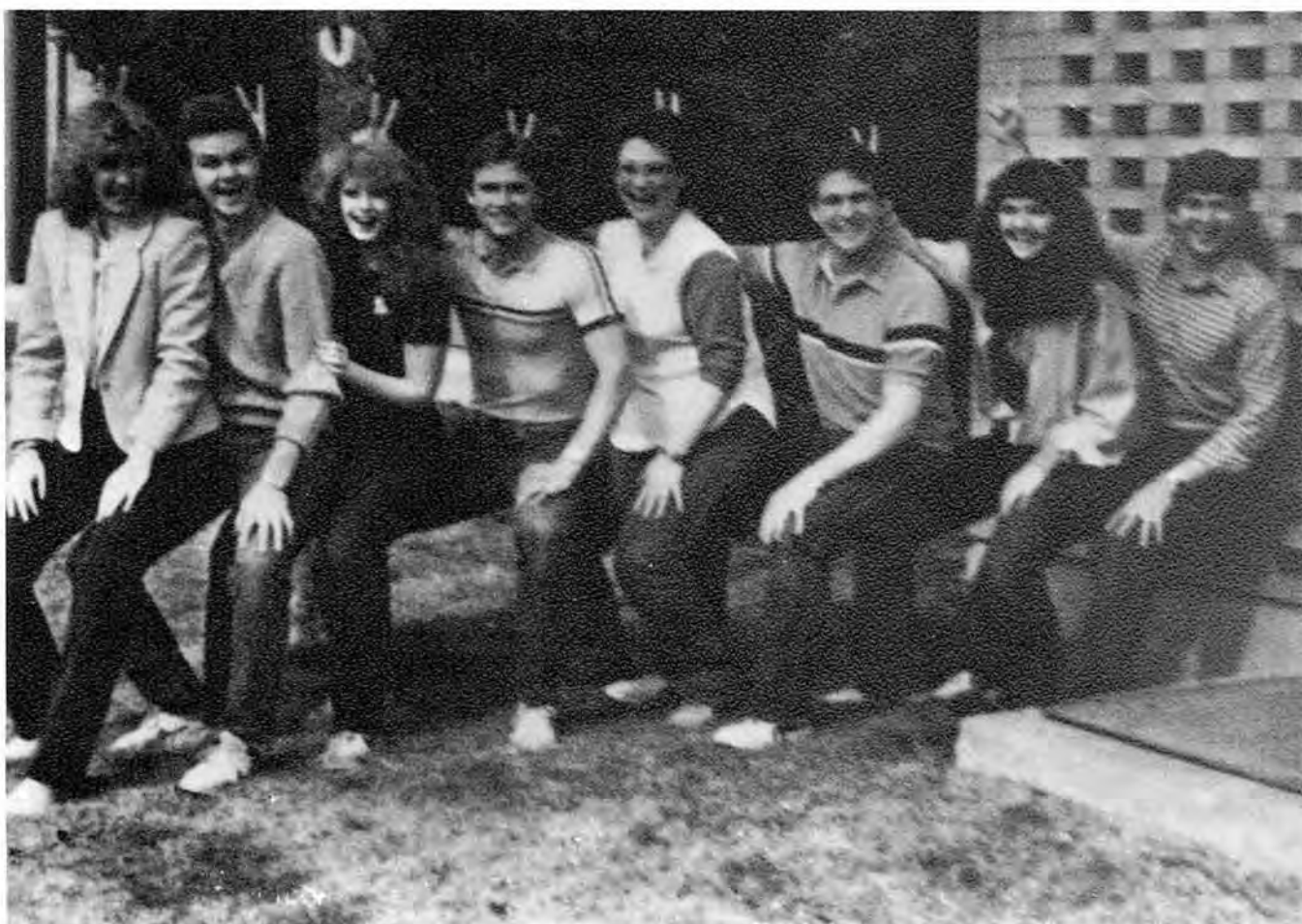

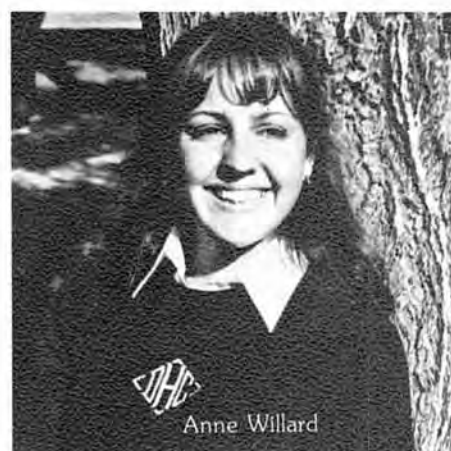

Milestone Reached



For the first time in the 71-year history of Dixie College, enrollment surpassed the 2,000 student mark at the beginning of the school year. A press conference was conducted by Dr. Peter Nyberg on Monday, October 18th during which the announcement of this historical milestone was made. The actual count for all quarter classes at registration was 2,010.

During the conference, sophomore and studentbody vice president Paul Reber, was presented a certificate by Dr. Nyberg symbolizing the 2,000th student to register at Dixie for the quarter.

The press conference was the first ever held in the history of Dixie College.



Six new tennis courts were added to Dixie College this year through the generosity of Mr. John Bell, a Bloomington resident.

The new courts are located on the corner of 300 S. and 700 E. across from the gymnasium parking lots and are officially named "Dixie Bell Courts."

A ceremony was held on Friday, November 12, 1982 to dedicate the courts and honor Mr. Bell. The activity was part of the 1982 Homecoming festivities.



Hansen Stadium Moves Towards Completion

A fund raising project for the new Hansen Stadium began Monday, October 1 when in excess of \$69,000 was raised by donations and pledges through the stadium chair purchase program.

Doug Allred, college director of athletics, explained that individuals who made an initial purchase would have season tickets for all stadium activities during the next year and the option to buy season tickets for the same seats the following year.

Following the first day of the chair sales, Allred commented that "We appreciate the tremendous effort made by local boosters and supporters of the college, and we feel that there are yet others in the community who will come forth and support us to help ultimately reach our goal of \$250,000 through the sales of stadium seats."

Upon its completion, the Hansen Stadium will be a great addition to Dixie College. Not only will it serve many uses for the college, but will be an added service to the community in the area of high school and city athletic programs.

The Hansen Stadium is scheduled for completion by the start of the 1983 football season.

Tears Fall On Alabama

Paul William "Bear" Bryant, The winningest coach in football history, died this year only five weeks after leading the Crimson Tide of Alabama to victory in the Dec. 29th Liberty Bowl.

Bryant, 69, died of a heart attack complicated by a series of other problems which he was said to have fought "heroically."

Bear, who had announced his retirement prior to the Liberty Bowl led his teams to 323 victories during his 38 years of head coaching, 25 of which he spent at Alabama.

In a letter Bryant wrote to one of his former players shortly before his death, he said, "Frankly I am sometimes embarrassed by the accolades that have been given me, because never enough is said about the people who worked so hard for me, individuals like you." He closed by saying that his wife of 47 years, Mary Harmon, "sends her love."

A nation wept, cheered and said goodbye as one of the most popular shows in the history of television aired its last episode on February 28th of this year.
