CAMP TRACY WIGWAM 1963

Camp Tracy Wigwam is equipped to give any unit a complete Long Term Camping program. Best of all we can give any part of scout camping and skills a unit leader might want the individual boys to experience. Not only experienced units but all units can be accommodated. Following are programs which may be what you are looking for:

1. Troop pays \$3.00 for each boy and brings and cooks own food with units own equipment. This includes your own tents if you so desire. Or you can use camp shelters.
2. Troops pay \$3.00 per boy and take some meals in the Central Dining Hall and furnish own meals for the balance. Cost of food in proportion to number of meals taken in Central Dining.
3. Troops pay \$15.00 per boy (one adult leader free including meals) and take all meals in Central Dining.
4. Troops unable to send an adult leader to camp can send boys on a provisional basis at \$17.00 per boy and the Camp will provide adult leadership. This is a great opportunity for units whose leaders cannot go to camp. All meals will be taken in the Central Dining Hall.

The provisional scoutmaster is a fully trained, successful scoutmaster in our Council. Your boys will have a first class experience.

STAFF A full staff of well trained leaders and older scouts will provide assistance in all scout crafts including; RIFLE RANGE, ARCHERY RANGE, FIRST AID, CAMP FIRES, COOKOUTS, OVERNIGHT CAMPING, AFTERNOON HIKES, HANDICRAFTS, FUN SWIMS, ADVANCEMENT WORK, SWIM IMPROVEMENT, NATURE TRAIL, BOATING, ORDER OF ARROW, TROOP CAMPFIRES, FISHING IN CREEK, INTERPATROL COMPETITION, CANOEING, CONSERVATION PROJECTS, CAMPING AND PIONEERING.

Suggested activities and program will be furnished each leader registering his troop.

TRADING POST will be open 8 hours per day. Ice cream, candy, soda pop, T-shirts, handicraft supplies, etc, are available at moderate cost.

RIFLE RANGE First ten shots free, thereafter 2¢ per shot or 75¢ per box. If scout brings his own shells to camp there will be a small charge for use of rifle.

CAMP DATES

INSURANCE The camp does not provide "Health and Accident" insurance for troops since this is the responsibility of parents and the troop. Many troops carry a policy that runs for one year and costs about \$1.00 per scout.

VISITORS Parents and friends are invited to come to camp for a visit, especially when your boys are in camp. There is no special time set aside for visiting, but it may be advantageous to arrange special troop campfires and invite the parents. Visitors are welcome at regular whole camp fires.

Our trading post is open to visitors as well as scouts and meals can be purchased in the dining hall, eating with the scouts at the following rates.

Breakfast 75¢

Lunch \$1.00

Dinner \$1.25

SAFETY FEATURES A medical examination prior to coming to camp and a recheck at camp insures everyone's health during the camp stay. The swimming program is under the direction of an adult trained in water safety. All scouts who canoe on the lake are closely supervised and are required to wear a life preserver when on the water. The rifle range and the archery range are under camp supervision at all times with safety instruction being a prime factor.

ADVANCEMENT The boys will have opportunity to work toward Second and First Class ranks and toward Merit Badges while in camp. The regular advancement procedures are followed with scoreboards being presented to troop board of review for approval. The awards are to be turned into headquarters with regular court of honor materials and badges are presented at regular troop courts. Merit badges should be started before the boys come to camp so that it will be possible to finish them at camp.

ONE WEEK AHEAD OF CAMP Boys get physical examination. Be sure to use official forms and to have "medical card" for pocket book filled out at same time. The billfold size card can be used during the rest of the year for swimming courses, winter camp, etc.

BRING TO CAMP

1. Medical form for all boys and leaders.
2. Up to date troop roster.
3. Registration fees for all new boys not on troop record.
4. Copies of program planning sheets you have filled out.
5. Balance of fee.
6. Personal gear for each boy (don't forget pack frames if boys are going on overnight hike).
7. Troop and Patrol gear if cooking own meals.
8. Other scout material.

DIRECTIONS Proceed along Wasatch Drive to 3800 South. There is a traffic light at that corner and a sign directing traffic up Millcreek Canyon to the East. Proceed 2 1/2 miles up the canyon and park in large parking lot about one block east of main lodge. Leader should then report to Camp Office and check the unit in.

REGISTRATION. A \$15.00 down payment made at Scout Office will reserve space. The balance of fee should be paid before going to camp. Only 125 boys per week maximum. Should extra boys come along their fees can be paid in camp.
