





BOOK REVIEW:

9 TOMORROWS

BY ISAAC ASIMOV

Nine Tomorrows is a collection of short stories about the future. One of the stories is The Last Question, which was a very successful show at the Hansen Plantarium located in Salt Lake. Also included in the book are stories about: The Olmpics, 21st century style, a child who found a mother- 40,000 years too late, a suicidal Computer, and other stories of the future.

Overall the book is very good. Asimov continues his consistency of good books. From this issue on I will judge the books on this scale:

Although we now can not cross those vast distances to the stars; it will not be to long before we will have the technology to do so.

Put by the time we are ready to travel to the stars, we will have to know more about the speed-time problem

than we do now.

Suppose we are going to the hearest star system, Alpha Centauri, 4.3 light years away. If we travel at the speed of an Apollo spacecraft returning to earth from the moon, (25,000 miles an hour or about 7 miles per second) simple arithmetic would show us that it would take about 115,000 years to reach Alpha Centauri! A two way trip would take 230,000 years. Obviously, if we are going to travel to the stars, we are soing to have to travel much factor.

Now if we were to travel at the speed of light(186,282 miles per second) it would take us 8.6 years to go to Alpha Centauri and back, according to the clocks at the

spacemort.

Nothing can exceed the speed of light, we are told. Although many noted science-fiction writers have writen about traveling faster than the speed of light. For now we are faced with a speed barrier. But things are not all bad for two reasons.

First if we can not go the speed of light, we could come so close we might as well be their. For instance, if the speed of light is 186,282 miles per second we

could go 186,281,9999999999 miles per second.

The second thing is part of Einstien's theory of relativity, called time dilation. To rut it simply as the speed of light is approached time slows down. For example, if a starship made a return journey to one of the nearer stars, traveling at two-thirds the speed of light, to the crew membersit would take only 9 years. But to the people on earth twelve years would have passed.

A starship would take months to accelerate to top speed. When the Apollo astronauts re-enter the earth they are subjected to a force of 6 g's or more. We could not except'a starship crew to withstand that many g's for months at a time. A realistic force would be 1 g during acceleration, which would last untill the midpoint of the journey. The deceleration g force would also be 1 g. This would be increased to 1.5 g's when the crew is asleep.

The table shows the time dilation effect on a starship crew.traveling at three different speeds. Acceleration with a force of 1 g would represent the slowest: 2 g's faster:

3 g's the fastest.

At 9:00pm, March 15th, 1975, an event that many had been waiting for began. It was in Century Gity where the Los Angeles International Film Exposition (Filmex)opened the doors to their

50 hour science fiction movie marathon which I attended.

Much planning took place to form this event with many names in Science Fiction working on it, like the special advisor was Ray Bradbury and special guests in person, like Buster Crabbe ("Flash Gordon"), Robby the Robot from "Forbidden Planet", "The Invisible Boy" and "Lost in Space Tv show, and Alexander Mackendrick (the director of "The Man in the White South

Their was more to it than sitting in a dark theatre watching 50. hours straight of science fiction movies. In the lobby their were many exibitsq one room of the original "War of the World" models, and many others, and shorts introducing George Powell's "Doc Savage" (George Pal has made Doc into a movie that will be realeased this summer). A display case had in it a blaster used against the monster from Id in "Forbidden Planet", and a uniform from the same movie. For a while Robby (the robot) wandered the lobby shaking peoples hands. Adults could find comfort in the lobby

by having a glass of chilled wine.

The movies chose for the marathon were excellently picked to show the wide range that science fiction covers: from the earliest science fiction classics like Metropolis and Things to Come all the way up to Forbidden Planet and 2001. A space oddyssey. The whole original Flash Gordon serial

was played. Besided the full moves, odd ads for science fiction movies were played and received laughs. Ads like The Space Children and even Young Frankenstein bloopers. Not one Toho production was shown in its entirety.

The Marathon ended with a classic which is one of my personal favorites. The Day the Earth stood Still. At 11:16, March 17th, 1975, a tired but happy audence exited the theare after 3001 minutes of science fiction. I gladly would have sat for 50 more hours. I'm sure even those who were slseping in the lobby will return next year for the Filmex science fiction marathon. by Mick Worthen
